THE KOREA MEDAL SERVICE IN THE KOREA OPERATIONS

SINCE 2nd JULY, 1950

1. - (i) The Committee on the grant of Honours, Decorations and Medals have had under consideration the need for the general recognition of service by British Commonwealth Forces on behalf of the United Nations in repelling aggression in Korea, since 2nd July, 1950, with special regard to the exacting nature of the conditions in which duty there is being carried out.

(ii) Their recommendations have been duly submitted to The King, who has been advised by the Prime Minister on matters likely to give rise to difference of opinion. His Majesty has now graciously approved the recommendations set out below.

2. Approval has been given for the institution of a Korea Medal for specified service in the Korea operations since 2nd July, 1950, inclusive, as described below. While present conditions last, service will continue to be a qualification up to a future date to be fixed in due course.

3. The Medal will bear on the obverse the Crowned Effigy of His Majesty, and will be in cupro-nickel. The design of the reverse is under consideration. The ribbon is in blue and yellow, the blue representing that of the United Nations flag.

Navy

4. - (i) Naval Service Afloat.

The qualifying service will be twenty-eight days, since 2nd July, 1950, inclusive, in ships or craft engaged in operations off the Korean coast.

(ii) Naval Service Ashore.

The qualifying period will be service of one day or more on duty ashore in Korea, since 2nd July, 1950, inclusive.

Army

5. The qualification in Army forces will be service of one day or more on the posted strength of a unit or formation in Korea, since 2nd July, 1950, inclusive.

Air Force

6. - (i) The qualification in Air Forces will be service, since 2nd July, 1950, inclusive, as follows: -

(a) one operational sortie over Korea or Korean waters, or

(b) service of one day or more on land in Korea, or

(c) service of twenty-eight days afloat in Korean waters.

(ii) The term "Korean waters" in this context means those areas of the Yellow Sea and the Sea of Japan over which it has been necessary to operate in support of operations in Korea.

General

7.-(i) *Short Service-*

(a) The grant to persons described in paragraphs 4 (i) and 6 (i) (c) above for gallantry on a specific occasion during the uncompleted qualifying period not amounting to twenty-eight days of a British Honour, Decoration or Medal of the status of the British Empire Medal or above, or a Mention in

Despatches or a King's Commendation, will qualify the recipient for the Korea Medal.

- (b) If qualifying service described in paragraphs 4(i) and 6(i)(c) above, is brought to an end before the completion of twenty-eight days, on account of death or evacuation owing to wounds or other disability due to service, the reduced period of service will be a qualification for the award.

(ii) Visits, Inspections. - For official visits, inspections, &c., on duty by members of Commonwealth Navies or Army or Air Forces in Korea, or in ships or craft engaged in operations of the Korean coast, the time qualification will be thirty days, either continuous or aggregated.

(iii) Service in Japan.-Service on land in Japan, or on the way to Japan from anywhere outside Korea or Korean waters, will not be qualifying operational service for the award of the Korea Medal.

Awards

8. Awards will be approved forthwith for those who have already qualified. For those who enter operational service in the future the award will be approved when they have qualified. The ribbon will be issued as soon as possible. The design of the Medal itself will require further consideration. It will be issued later.

Mentions in Despatches

9. When a Mention in Despatches has been granted for service in the Korea operations the single bronze oak leaf Emblem will be worn on the ribbon of the Korea Medal.

Civilian Categories

10. Members of certain civilian categories named below, who have served with British Commonwealth Forces in the Korea operations, will be eligible for the Korea Medal should their respective Governments so desire.

- (i) Under the same rules as for naval forces,

Members of the British Red Cross Society and Order of St. John Voluntary Aid Detachment in a United Kingdom Hospital Ship, who wore the approved uniform.

- (ii) Under the same rules as for Army forces,

Members of the following organisations who wore the approved uniform:-

- (a) Cable and Wireless Detachments,
- (b) British Red Cross Society and Order of St. John,
- (c) Salvation Army,
- (d) Y.M.C.A.

Canada, Australia, New Zealand and the Union of South Africa

11. The Governments of Canada, Australia, New Zealand and the Union of South Africa have already been informed of the arrangements, so that the Forces of those countries may participate should their respective Governments so desire.

New Zealand Army Order 4/52 KOREA MEDAL

INSTITUTION AND DESCRIPTION

1. His Majesty the King has been graciously pleased to approve of a new medal being struck to commemorate service by the British Commonwealth Forces on behalf of the United Nations in repelling aggression in Korea.

2. (a) The medal is to be known as the Korea Medal.

(b) It will be of cupro-nickel and bear on the obverse a crowned effigy of the King. The design of the reverse is yet to be finalised.

(c) The ribbon is in blue and yellow, the blue representing the United Nations flag.

3. His Majesty, on the recommendation of the NZ Government has approved of this medal being issued to qualified personnel of the NZ Armed Forces.

ELIGIBILITY

4. The qualifying conditions in the Army will be:-

(a) *Army Personnel*. – Service of one day or more on the posted strength of a unit or formation in Korea from 20 Jul 1950 to a date to be decided later, inclusive. [Final date amended to 28th July 1953]

(b) *For official visits, inspections etc*, on duty by Army personnel in Korea or in ships or craft engaged in operations off the Korean coast, the time qualification will be thirty days, either continuous or aggregated.

(c) *Service in Japan* or on the way to Japan from anywhere outside Korea or Korean waters will not be qualifying operational service for the award of this medal.

(d) (i) *New Zealand war correspondents* who have served with the British Commonwealth Army Forces in the Korean operations will be eligible for the Korea Medal, provided they wore the approved uniform, were properly accredited to the Army Forces, and were subject to military discipline. They will qualify under the same rules as for Army personnel, provided that the qualifying period will be thirty, either continuous or aggregated.

(ii) If the qualifying service of a war correspondent is brought to an end before the completion of thirty days on account of death or evacuation owing to wounds or other disability due to service, the reduced period of service will be a qualification for the award.

(iii) The service of war correspondents with civil bodies representing the United Nations Secretariat or specialised agencies, or with civil bodies such as the United Nations Commission for the Unification and Rehabilitation of Korea, will not be a qualification for the Korea Medal.

- (iv) War correspondents who have accepted, or accept, from any foreign Government a general award in recognition of service in Korean operations will not be eligible for the Korea Medal.

MENTION IN DESPATCHES EMBLEM

5. When a Mention in Despatches has been awarded for service in Korea operations, the single broze (sic, bronze) oak leaf emblem will be worn on the ribbon of the Korea Medal.

AWARDS

6. Commander, Kayforce, may approve awards of the medal to personnel serving under his command who qualify in terms of para 4 (a) above. All awards must be published in Routine Orders Part II.

7. Officer in Charge, NZEF Records, Army HQ will assess the entitlement of personnel returned to NZ or deceased and will endorse their documents appropriately.

8. Any case where doubt exists as to eligibility, and all applications in respect of service defined in para 4 (b) and (d) will be referred to Army HQ for decision.

INITIAL ISSUE OF RIBBON

9. As soon as supplies of ribbon are available, and thereafter as soon as awards of the medal are approved, approving authorities (as in paras 6 and 7 above) will make a free issue of 4 inches of the ribbon to officers or soldiers concerned.

This Order was amended by a number of orders in the following months and years.

NZAO 58/53 deleted from para 4. (a) “a date to be decided later” and inserted “28 July 1953” as the final qualifying date for the award of the Korea Medal. This Army Order also inserted a new clause as sub para 4. (e)

- (e) *Official Concert Parties*. Personnel of official concert parties sent to Korea from New Zealand will qualify if they aggregate thirty days in Korea or in ships or craft engaged in operations off the Korean coast.

**Grant of the United Nations Service Medal, with clasp, Korea, for
Service in Defence of the Principles of the Charter of the
United Nations since 27th June 1950.**

1. His Majesty the King has been graciously, pleased to approve the acceptance by personnel of the United Kingdom Forces and British Commonwealth Forces, of a United Nations Service Medal with clasp, "Korea", for service in defence of the Principles of the Charter of the United Nations during the period 27th June 1950, to a date to be decided later, inclusive.

2. (a) The medal will be known as "The United Nations Service Medal".
(b) A clasp bearing the word "KOREA" constitutes part of the suspension of the medal from the ribbon.
(c) The ribbon consists of nine blue and eight white alternating stripes, the blue representing that of the United Nations flag.
(d) The United Nations Service Medal will be worn immediately after the Korea Medal, or in accordance with the order of precedence for war medals laid down in regulations.
3. The medal will be granted -
 - (a) to officers and other ranks of the British Army and British Commonwealth Forces, the eligibility of whose units has been published in General Orders by the United Nations Commander-in-Chief.
 - (b) to members of the specially approved civilian categories whose organisations have been certified by the United Nations Commander-in-Chief as having directly supported military operations in Korea, and,
 - (c) posthumously, in the case of those eligible who died before receiving it; the medal being given to the legal beneficiary in accordance with the provisions laid down in King's Regulations.

4. The qualifying conditions will be:-

- (a) (i) *Army personnel on the posted strength of a unit or formation* - service of one day or more in Korea or in certain areas adjacent thereto (to be defined later).
- (ii) *For Carrier-borne Ground Liaison Sections and other Army personnel posted for duty in H.M. Ships of the Royal Navy engaged in operations in Korean waters*, the time qualification will be service of one day or more.
- (iii) *For official visits, inspections, etc., by Army personnel on duty*- service of 30 days, either continuous or aggregated, while inspecting or visiting units eligible to qualify for the award.
- (b) *Civilian categories*.-Service of one day or more in Korea or in certain areas adjacent thereto (to be defined later). Details will be published in due course of those whose entitlement has been authorized in General Orders by the United Nations Commander-in-Chief.
- (c) *Special awards*. - Service in active operations against the enemy under conditions *other* than those prescribed in (a) and (b) above, if such action has been rewarded by the grant of a personal honour or decoration, or if an individual certificate testifying to such operational service has been furnished by the commander of an independent force, or of a division, ship or air group or comparable or higher unit.

Note. No personnel of the United Nations or its specialised agencies or of any national government service other than members of land, sea and air forces and those civilian categories referred to at para, 3 (b) and no *International* Red Cross personnel engaged for service under the United Nations Commander-in-Chief with any United Nations relief team in Korea, are eligible for the award the medal.

- 5. (a) (i) Officers commanding units (Officers i/c Administration for senior officers and extra-regimentally employed personnel may authorize the wearing of the ribbon by personnel of those units specified as eligible in General Orders by the United Nations Commander-in-Chief.

- (ii) Any medal rolls (A.F. B95) still held (*which were prepared for the Korea Medal in accordance with Army Order 103 of 1951*) should be endorsed as follows :-

"Certified that the unit of the under mentioned personnel has been published as eligible for the United Nations Service Medal in United Nations Commander-in-Chief's General Order No., and that all the personnel listed, except those marked with an asterisk, have been issued with the ribbon".

The names of individuals to whom the ribbon has not been issued will be marked with an asterisk.

- (iii) A similar certificate, in memorandum form, should be submitted for personnel of units in Korea who have already sent nominal rolls for the Korea Medal to the United Kingdom.
- (b) (i) Officers commanding units (Officers i/c Administration for senior officers and extra-regimentally employed personnel) will prepare medal rolls on A.F. B 95 for all personnel, who, though eligible to qualify for the United Nations Service Medal, are ineligible for the Korea Medal. The actual place(s) of service should be shown in the "remarks" column and the number of the General Order of the United Nations Commander-in-Chief should be quoted.
- (ii) The names of officers and warrant officers will be entered in order of rank and the names of non-commissioned officers and men will be entered in alphabetical order.
- (iii) The names of individuals convicted of offences for which the award is to be forfeited, under the conditions laid down in King's Regulations, 1940, Appendix XXXI will be entered in red on the rolls and the nature of the offence stated in the "remarks" column.
- (c) The rolls of other ranks may then be forwarded for safe custody to the appropriate Officer i/c Records and those for officers to the Under-Secretary of State, The War Office (A.G. 4 Medals). Further instructions concerning the submission of the rolls to the War Office will be issued to Officers i/c Records in due course.
6. All applications in respect of service defined in para. 4(a) (iii) above will be submitted in memorandum form to the Under-Secretary of State, The War Office (A.G. 4 Medals). Full details of the nature of the duties, the authority for the visit, etc., and the dates of entry to and exit from the operational area will be supplied with each application. A.F. B 95 is not required to be submitted in such cases.
7. (i) An officer who has left the operational area and is not serving with his unit may make an individual application in memorandum form (in lieu of A.F. B 95) to the Under-Secretary of State, The War Office (A.G. 4 Medals) as follows:-

- (ii) An application in similar form may be made by the present commanding officer in respect of any individual, other rank who is no longer serving with his qualifying unit, and where there is some doubt as to whether his name has been included in a unit nominal roll.
- 8. (a) Officers not now serving, or the legal beneficiaries of those deceased, may apply direct to the Under-Secretary of State, The War Office (A.G. 4 Medals).
- (b) (i) Other ranks discharged, or released, or transferred to the Royal Army Reserve, and the legal beneficiaries of those deceased, should apply to the Officer i/c Records of the regiment or corps with which the last period of army service was rendered.
- (ii) A nominal roll on A.F. B 95 should be prepared and certified by the Officer i/c Records in respect of eligible individuals whose names are not included in the roll submitted by the unit.

9. Administrative duties in connection with the award and issue of medals to members of the approved civilian categories referred to at para. 4(b) above will be undertaken by the War Office (A.G. 4 Medals).

10 The issue of the medal will be undertaken as soon as circumstances permit.

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*Appendix 5.***United Nations Service Medal with “Korea” Clasp****New Zealand Army Order 5/52****INSTITUTION**

1. A medal to be known as the United Nations Service Medal has been established by Resolution 483(V) of the United Nations General Assembly, adopted on 12 Dec 50.

2. His Majesty the King has approved the proposal to institute this medal and the wearing of it by qualified personnel of the British Commonwealth Forces.

DESCRIPTION

3. The medal is of bronze alloy, circular in form and 1.4 inches in diameter. The obverse bears the emblem of the United Nations and the reverse, within a rim, the inscription “For service in the Defence of the Principles of the Charter of the United Nations”.

CLASP

4. A bar 1½ in long and ¼ in wide, constituting a part of the suspension of the medal from the ribbon, shall bear the word “Korea”.

WEARING

5. The medal shall be worn on the left breast suspended by a silk ribbon 1.33 in wide, consisting of nine stripes of United Nations blue and eight white stripes alternating, each 0.08 inch in width.

6. It shall be worn immediately after the Korea Medal, or, if the Korea Medal has not been granted, it shall be worn in order of date, in the same way as British war medals are worn.

MINIATURES

7. The miniature of this medal and ribbon, to be worn in accordance with existing instructions relating to the wearing of miniatures, shall be on a scale of one half of the service medal and ribbon.

ELIGIBILITY IN NEW ZEALAND ARMY

8. Personnel serving in the New Zealand Emergency Force (Kayforce) despatched to Korea or adjacent areas for service on behalf of the United Nations in the action in Korea who fulfil the conditions prescribed in paras 9 and 10 below shall be eligible for the award of the medal with the “Korea” clasp.

9. Service must have been rendered between the 27 June 50 and a terminal date to be announced later by the Secretary-General of the United Nations, both dates inclusive, under either of the following conditions:-

- (a) Within the Territorial limits of Korea or the waters immediately adjacent thereto or in the air over Korea or over such waters; or
- (b) With the units which have been certified by the United Nations Commander-in-Chief as having directly supported military operation in Korea (see para 11 below).

10. The service prescribed must have been performed either-

- (a) While serving with a unit coming within the provisions of para 8 above, as follows:-

- (i) While posted to such a unit for any period between the dates specified in para 9 above; or
- (ii) While attached to such a unit for a period of thirty consecutive or non-consecutive days between the dates specified in para 9 above; or
- (b) While on active operations against the enemy under conditions other than those prescribed in sub-para (a) of this paragraph, if an operational award has been awarded or an individual certificate testifying to such operational service has been furnished by the commander of an independent force or of a division, ship, or air group or comparable higher unit.

APPROVAL OF AWARDS

11. The United Nations Commander-in-Chief shall publish General Orders listing United Nations units eligible for the award of the medal with clasp.

12. (a) The inclusion of a New Zealand Army unit, or of NZ Army units, in these General Orders will be the authority for Commander, Kayforce, to approve the award of the medal, clasp, and ribbon to personnel of that unit, or units, who otherwise comply with the qualifying conditions, and who are serving in Korea or Japan at the time.

(b) All awards will be published in Routine Orders, Part II.

13. (a) Officer in Charge, NZEF Records, Army HQ, will determine eligibility of personnel who have returned from overseas, and of deceased personnel. Medals awarded posthumously will be disposed of in conformity with existing regulations relating to British decorations and medals.

(b) Officer in Charge, NZEF Records, will endorse the documents of these personnel appropriately.

14. Where there is any doubt as to the eligibility of an officer or soldier, the case will be referred to Army HQ for decision.

INITIAL ISSUE OF RIBBON

15. An initial free issue of 2½ inches of ribbon will be made by approving authorities (see paras 12 and 13 above) to each officer and soldier to whom the issue of the medal has been approved.

16. The ribbon for this issue will be made available by the Secretary-General of the United Nations. The ribbon for issue to eligible personnel serving at the time of issue with the United Nations land, sea, or air forces will be made available through the United Nations Commander-in-Chief.

General Medal Information

Despatch of UN Medals for Korea

On 10 February 1954 a letter was despatched from the United Nations Headquarters in New York to inform the Adjutant General, New Zealand Army, that 1,350 United Nations Service Medals were despatched by the Administration des Monnaies et Medailles, of Paris. This was the number, which according to the UN Headquarters was due to New Zealand up to 31 December 1953.

Discharge Certificates

Each serviceman (except Regular Force) who served in Korea or in Korean Waters was issued with a numbered Discharge Certificate (Army Form NZ 22) on linen backed waterproof paper, that showed the serviceman's number, rank on release from Kayforce and full name of the individual. The time served in New Zealand, time served in Korea and total service in Kayforce is also detailed. The date he was 'Struck off the Strength' of Kayforce is also displayed. All the information entered on the certificate had to be without any correction and only one was issued to each person. No duplicates were held and if the certificate was lost it could not be replaced.

The Certificates were posted by Registered Mail to the last known address of the individual (as far as could be ascertained) during February and March 1957. Several certificates were returned as the recipient had moved for work or family reasons and no forwarding address was provided to ensure that each man received his Discharge Certificate, Army kept a list that included the Discharge Certificate number, the name of the recipient, town of residence (as best known at the time) and the date that it was sent. A copy of one of these Certificates is shown.

Several men did not receive a Discharge Certificate as they returned to their TF unit and were discharged from there. Others were discharged SNLR ('Services No Longer Required') and did not receive the Kayforce Discharge Certificate.

A surprising number of the Discharge Certificate can still be found on files of those who served in Kayforce.

International Co-operation and Medical Treatment

Most New Zealanders can remember that our troops fought alongside British and Australian forces in the 28 Commonwealth Brigade, and that the United States and Korea had large numbers of troops involved. Few people can recall that New Zealand had close liaison with other national teams that were part of the UN forces. For example, New Zealand troops involved in accidents, wounded through armed conflict, or sickness, were treated from time to time at the Norwegian MASH unit, Swedish Hospital, 60 Indian Field Ambulance, 25 Canadian Field Dressing Station, Canadian Field Ambulance, US Army 121 Medical Evacuation Hospital, 8055 MASH and 8228 MASH, the Brit Comwel Com Z Medical Unit and the British Commonwealth General Hospital, Kure, Japan.

Recent Medallic Recognition

As mentioned above the issue of three new awards has marked further recognition of service in Korea since 1958. A further two medals have been authorised but are not relevant to this list. On first applying for service medals in 1999 some New Zealand servicemen were advised that they did not qualify for any awards. However within a year this situation had changed with new awards being authorised and a reassessment of the award criteria for some others.

The first award in the order of precedence is the **New Zealand Operational Service Medal** that received Royal assent on 23 July 2002. This medal is worn before all war and campaign medals issued since the end of the Second World War. The principle reasoning behind this is that the medal has been awarded in recognition of service to New Zealand whereas the campaign medal shows the area of operational deployment or service. The Royal Warrant is shown overleaf.

Secondly the Korean Government offered the **Korean War Service Medal** principally to all surviving, "...Korean War veterans from New Zealand, and other members of the British Commonwealth such as Australia, Canada and South Africa". The letter continues with a sentence to the effect that if there were a significant number of requests for posthumous awards the Korean Government would consider the matter. In reading through the list of men who served in Korea it may be noted that the entitlement for this medal is absent if the serviceman had died before this medal was accepted by the NZ Government and authorised for wear.

A letter from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs & Trade dated 23 April 2001 states that, "*The Ministry has advised through the Cabinet Office that Her Majesty the Queen of New Zealand has been pleased to grant full and unrestricted permission to all those surviving New Zealanders who served in Korea to accept and wear the Korean War Service Medal which the Government of the Republic of Korea wishes to confer on them*". The letters from the Korean Government and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs are shown below. This medal is worn after British and Commonwealth awards and after the New Zealand General Service Medal, which was authorised over a year later.

Another recent award is the **New Zealand General Service Medal** authorised under the Royal Warrant dated 23 July 2002. This medal, with clasp "**Korea 1954-57**", was issued under the **New Zealand General Service Medal (Korea 1954-57) Regulations** of the same date. The Royal Warrant and the Regulations are shown in the following pages.

Finally the **New Zealand Defence Service Medal** (in bronze) instituted in 2011 is the most recent medal for which personnel who served in the NZ forces in Korea can now apply. As a general rule three-years' service in the Regular Force, Territorial Force, the Compulsory Military Training scheme or National Service will qualify. A clasp for each is available. The maximum number of clasps that can be gained is three. Most veterans now say enough is enough.

Elizabeth the Second, by the Grace of God Queen of New Zealand and Her Other Realms and Territories, Head of the Commonwealth, Defender of the Faith, to all to whom the Presents shall come, Greeting!

Whereas We are desirous of instituting a medal to award to members of Our New Zealand Defence Force and certain other New Zealanders who undertake operational service:

We do by these Presents for Us, Our Heirs and Successors, institute and create a new Medal.

- 1 **Style**
The Medal shall be styled and designated “The New Zealand Operational Service Medal”.

- 2 **Description**
The medal shall be made of a silver-plated base-metal and circular in shape, bearing, -
 - (a) On the obverse, a representation of the New Zealand Coat of Arms; and
 - (b) On the reverse, a representation of a Kiwi, facing to the right, and below it the inscription “NEW ZEALAND” between two heraldic stars (mulletts), and underneath the whole of which are three wavy lines and the inscription “FOR OPERATIONAL SERVICE”.

- 3 **Ribbon**
The Medal shall be worn from the left breast suspended from a ribbon, 32 millimetres in width, composed of 11 alternating black and white stripes.

- 4 **Commencement Date**
The Medal shall be awarded for operational service on or after 3 September 1945.

5 Regulations

The Medal shall be awarded for operational service under Regulations that the Governor-General of New Zealand, acting on the advice of the Prime Minister or a Minister of the Government acting for the Prime Minister, may determine.

6 Register

The names of all those persons who receive the Medal shall be recorded in a register kept by the Chief of Defence Force.

7 Order of wear

In the official list showing the order in which Orders, Decorations, and Medals shall be worn in New Zealand, the Medal shall be worn as a war medal immediately after the New Zealand War Service Medal 1939-45 and before any other war medal issued for service from 3 September 1945.

8 Miniatures

Reproductions of the Medal, in miniature, which may be worn on certain occasions by those persons who have received the Medal, shall not exceed one-half of the size of the full-size Medal.

9 Annulment

We reserve to Ourselves, Our Heirs and Successors, full power of annulling, altering, abrogating, augmenting, interpreting, or dispensing with Our Royal Warrant, or any part of it, by a notification under Our Sign Manual.

New Zealand Operational Service Medal Regulations 2002

Silvia Cartwright, Governor-General

Pursuant to the Royal Warrant (SR 2002/223 dated 23 July 2002) instituting and creating the New Zealand Operational Service Medal, the Governor-General of New Zealand, under authority delegated by The Queen, has been pleased to make the following regulations.

Regulations

- 1 Title**
These regulations are the New Zealand Operational Service Medal Regulations 2002.
- 2 Commencement**
These regulations come into force on the 28th day after the date of their notification in the *Gazette*.
- 3 New Zealand Operational Service Medal**
The New Zealand Operational Service Medal is awarded subject to the Royal Warrant and to these regulations.

4 Eligibility

The following persons are eligible for the Medal:

- (a) persons who were, at any time, members of the armed forces (within the meaning of section 2(1) of the Defence Act 1971);
- (b) persons who were, at any time, members of—
 - (i) the New Zealand Naval Forces (within the meaning of the Navy Act 1954); or
 - (ii) the New Zealand Army (within the meaning of the New Zealand Army Act 1950); or
 - (iii) the Royal New Zealand Air Force (within the meaning of the Royal New Zealand Air Force Act 1950);
- (c) persons who were, at any time, members of—
 - (i) the Defence Forces (within the meaning of the Defence Act 1909); or
 - (ii) the Naval Forces (within the meaning of the Naval Defence Act 1913); or
 - (iii) the Royal New Zealand Air Force (within the meaning of the Air Force Act 1937);
- (d) civilian members of the New Zealand Defence Force and other civilian persons, including persons who were, at any time, members of—
 - (i) the New Zealand Police Force (within the meaning of the Police Force Act 1908); or
 - (ii) the New Zealand Police Force (within the meaning of the Police Act 1947); or
 - (iii) the New Zealand Police (within the meaning of the Police Act 1958);
- (e) any other persons whom the Minister of Defence, on the advice of the Chief of Defence Force, may determine.

5 Qualifications for award

A person qualifies for the award of the Medal if he or she meets the requirements of regulation 4 and—

- (a) has been awarded either—
 - (i) a New Zealand or a Commonwealth, British, or other non-New Zealand medal for service in a war, or warlike or non-warlike (including peacekeeping) operation, and that medal has been approved for wearing as a war or campaign

medal in the official list in which orders, decorations, and medals must be worn in New Zealand;
or

- (ii) the Rhodesia Medal (1980); or
- (b) has served 7 days or more, continuous or aggregated, on the posted strength of a unit or formation on land and that service was a qualifying service towards 1 or more medals in paragraph (a); or
- (c) has served 7 days or more, continuous or aggregated, in a ship or craft and that service was a qualifying service towards 1 or more medals in paragraph (a); or
- (d) has completed 7 sorties or more as aircrew or supernumerary crew and that service was qualifying service towards 1 or more medals in paragraph (a); or
- (e) has served 30 days, continuous or aggregated, for official service visits, inspections, or other occurrences of a temporary nature on duty and that service was a qualifying service towards 1 or more medals in paragraph (a); or
- (f) has served 7 days, continuous or aggregated, on the posted strength of a unit permanently based in Singapore between 1 February 1959 and 31 July 1960; or
- (g) has served 7 days either—
 - (i) while posted to the New Zealand contribution to Operation Plainfare (Berlin airlift) in West Germany between 1 September 1948 and 11 August 1949; or
 - (ii) was seconded to the Royal Air Force in West Germany and participated in Operation Plainfare; or
- (h) any other operational service, irrespective of whether a war or campaign medal has been awarded for that service, that the Minister of Defence, on the advice of the Chief of Defence Force, may determine.

6 Accumulated service

The Medal shall be awarded for only the first period of operational service that qualifies a person for a Medal.

7 Delegation

The Chief of Defence Force or an officer of the New Zealand Defence Force authorised by the Chief of Defence Force may award the New Zealand Operational Service Medal to any eligible person who qualifies for the award of that Medal.

8 Forfeiture and restoration

It shall be competent for the Chief of Defence Force or a Chief of Staff acting for the Chief of Defence Force to—

- (a) cancel and annul the conferment of the Medal on a person; and
- (b) if the conferment of the Medal on a person has been cancelled or annulled, restore the Medal to that person.

PURSUANT to the Royal Warrant * dated 7 May 1992 (as altered by the Royal Warrant § dated 4 August 1997) instituting and creating the New Zealand General Service Medal, Her Majesty the Queen has been graciously pleased to make the following Regulations.

REGULATIONS

1. **Title and commencement** – (1) These regulations may be cited as the New Zealand General Service Medal (Korea 1954-57) Regulations 1998.

(2) These regulations come into force on the 28th day after the date of their notification in the *Gazette*.

2. **Korea 1954-57**– (1) The award of the New Zealand General Service Medal in bronze with the clasp “Korea 1954-57” in bronze is approved.

(2) The medal and clasp are awarded subject to the Royal Warrant and to regulation 3.

3. **Qualifications for award**– (1) A person qualifies for the award of the medal and clasp who has served during the period beginning on 27 Jul 1954 and ending with 31 December 1957 in Korea, its adjacent waters, or Japan if –

- (a) That service was as a member of the New Zealand Army (within the meaning of the New Zealand Army Act 1950), the Royal New Zealand Air Force (within the meaning of the Royal New Zealand

Air Force Act 1950), or the Royal New Zealand Naval Forces (within the meaning of the Navy Act 1954); and

(b) That service was as part of the British Commonwealth Forces attached to the United Nations Unified Command in one of the following:

- (i) On the posted strength of a unit or formation; or
- (ii) While posted for duty in H.M. Ships of the Royal Navy or H.M.N.Z.S. Ships of the Royal New Zealand Navy; or
- (iii) While seconded or on exchange with a Commonwealth or foreign defence force; and

(c) One of the following applies:

- (i) That service was for 30 days or more, not necessarily continuous; or
- (ii) That service was ended, before the completion of 30 days, by death or evacuation owing to illness or injury or a disability arising from that service; or
- (iii) That service was less than 30 days' service, but the person has been given a Royal Honour for gallantry in Korea, its adjacent waters, or Japan.

(2) A person does not qualify for the award of the medals and clasp if the person qualified for the award of either the Korea Medal 1950-53 or the United Nations Service Medal with clasp "Korea" or both.

4. Delegation- Pursuant to clause 11 (2) of the Royal Warrant, the Chief of Defence Force, or a Chief of Staff acting for the Chief of Defence Force is authorised to award the New Zealand General Service Medal with clasp "Korea 1954-57" to any member of the New Zealand Defence Force who is qualified for the award of that medal with the award of that medal with the clasp "Korea 1954-57".

The Embassy of the Republic of Korea presents its compliments to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade of New Zealand and has the honour to inform the latter of the Government of the Republic of Korea's intention to provide Korean War Service Medals to New Zealand veterans who took part in the Korean War, from the outbreak of hostilities on June 25, 1950 to the signing of the armistice agreement on July 27, 1953. The Government of the Republic of Korea seeks the support of the New Zealand Government for the distribution of these medals in New Zealand.

The purpose of the issue of the medal is to pay tribute to Korean War veterans, on the occasion of the 50th Anniversary of the Korean War, for their historic *Endeavours* to preserve the freedom of the Republic of Korea. The medal was originally offered to United Nations Forces in Korea and adjacent waters in 1951 but many were unable to receive the medal due to the laws of their countries at that time. However, last year the medal was awarded to veterans from the United States of America through the cooperation of the United States Ministry of Defence.

The medal is to be awarded to Korean War veterans from New Zealand and other members of the British Commonwealth such as Australia, Canada and South Africa. The medal will principally be awarded to living veterans. If there are a significant number of requests for posthumous awards, however, the Korean Government will consider the matter.

The Korean War Service Medal is to be worn as an official medallic recognition of the significant contribution and bravery of New Zealand veterans.

The Embassy of the Republic of Korea avails itself of this opportunity to renew to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade of New Zealand the assurances of its highest consideration.

Scale for Honours and Awards

On 28 October 1950 the Secretary of State for Commonwealth Relations, London sent a letter to the Minister of Internal Affairs Wellington setting out the scale of awards for service. It stated:

1. *“The King has been pleased to approve following scales of award of honours, decorations and medals for gallantry and other military services in operations in or over Korea, and in Korean waters.*

2. *The maximum scale for award of all orders, decorations and medals to naval, army and air force personnel (other than air force personnel mentioned in paragraph 3 below) serving on land in Korea, or service afloat while engaged in operations off Korean coast, will be one in 250 in six months, based on the average number engaged in qualifying operational service in each period.*

3 (I) *For aircrew of air force maximum flying hour scale, that is to say, the divisor or number of aircraft operational hours which will warrant the award, for operations over Korea or Korean waters, will be 300.*

(II) *Non-aircrew personnel of air forces serving in Korea or in Korean waters, and belonging to units whose air-crew are operating on a flying hour scale, will be eligible for non-flying awards at up to 15 percent of flying hour scale.*

4. *Recommendations will not be made simply because awards are available within permissible maxima. No recommendations will be put forward which do not fulfil required standards. George Cross, George Medal and British Empire Medal recommendations will account against operational scales. Forces eligible for above operational scales will not be eligible for awards from ordinary half-yearly allocation in addition.*

5. (I) *Maximum scale of award for Mentions in Despatches for naval, army and air force personnel (other than air force personnel mentioned in paragraph 5 (II) below) serving on land in Korea, or in Korean waters, will be 1 in 150 in six months.*

(II) *Aircrew of units of air force on a flying hour scale and non-aircrew personnel in Korea or Korean waters, belonging to these units, will be eligible for Mentions in Despatches at maximum scale of 5 mentions for 3 honours granted.*

6. *Maximum scale in army and air force for Commander-in-Chief’s cards for good service, and in the navy for similar naval recommendations will be, in six months, 1 in 150 for officers and warrant officers, and 1 in 750 for other ranks. The cards will be restricted to service in or over Korea or in Korean waters.*

7. *Operational scales of award will not apply to service on land in Japan.*

8. *For that part of the Army Korea Force stationed in Japan.”*

Honours and Awards Gained by Kayforce personnel:

A list of the names of men who received honours and awards for Korean service is found in Appendix II of *New Zealand and the Korean War* by Ian McGibbon.

Korean Presidential Unit Citation:

Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II has approved the Republic of Korea Presidential Citation as an official award.

Qualifying criteria for this ROK Presidential Citation is service in Korea between 15 December 1950 and 1 November 1951 as a member of 16 Field Regiment, RNZA. This includes any who were subsequently reposted to other units during that period, even if their service with 16 Field Regiment was only for one day. Also included are those from other Corps attached to 16 Field Regiment including the RNZEME, LAD and G Troop, 1 Comwel Div Sig Regt, RNZ Signals.
